TRANSMISSION FLU- IDS: Automobile, van, trucks, etc.	Gary's Auto Repair, Ad- vance Auto Parts, Auto Zone, and Monro Muf- fler will accept trans- mission fluids.
TURPENTINE: Used in paint strippers and thinners and are flam- mable	Solidify the liquid with an absorbent, then throw away.
Upholstery Cleaners: Scotch Guard, Bissel	Normally water based and can be diluted and disposed down a drain and then thrown in the trash
Varnishes: Read the label, be aware of any fumes. Leave open to dry out or evaporate	Once solidified or hard- ened, it may go into the trash. Brush or use re- maining on cardboard
WEED KILLER: Herbi- cides also known as weed killers are chemi- cals used to control unwanted weeds or grass.	If you have excess weed killer, follow directions and use it up on a lawn.

THERMOMETERS: Look for a liquid, if it uses a metallic strip or coil to measure the tempera- ture (like a meat ther- mometer) it does not contain mercury. If the liquid is silver, assume that it is mercury. The label should define what is used.	Defiance County Envi- ronmental Services will recycle thermom- eters with Mercury
THERMOSTATS: Elec- tronic and magnetic snap switches do not contain mercury. If a glass bulb is inside, it does have mercury	Defiance County Envi- ronmental Services will recycle thermo- stats with Mercury.
Toilet Bowl Cleaners: The Works, Lysol, Clorox, etc.	These are meant to go down a toilet. Throw container in the trash.
Toner Cartridges: Most manufacturers will ac- cept used ones.	Register on line with Office Depot to recycle toner cartridges.

Spray Cans: Or aerosol cans can be use dup (all gases are used) and thrown in to the trash.	Fulton County Residents may check with Clean- lites Recycling. Clean- lites received grant fund- ing to implement an aer- osol can recycling sys- tem
Stainless Steel Clean- er: May contain toxic chemicals.	Liquids and pastes may be diluted and put in a drain or directly into the trash
Stove Cleaners: Many options for glass top, stainless, flat surfaces, removeable burners, etc.	Read the labels, but most may be thrown into the trash
Televisions: Analog, Digital, Plasma, Flat Screens, Tubes	TV's have very little com- ponents worth recycling. They can be thrown into the trash or taken to a landfill.

Sanitizers: May contain bleach, alcohol, vinegar.	Minor acids and chlo- rine can be diluted and poured down a drain.
SEALANTS: Are available for a variety of uses: concrete, walls, roofs, tires, etc.	Read the labels for use and disposal. Many can be left to harden or solidify before throwing in trash.
SHELLACS: A shellac finish has been used by woodworkers since the early 1800's, it is nontoxic and can be used as a sealer before a stain is applied.	Read the label. Shel- lacs can be hardened or solidified.
SOLVENTS: you see flammable, combus- tible, caution or warn- ing, the solvent contains chemicals.	Flammable materials should be mixed with sand,, or sawdust, or kitty litter to solidify.
Spot Removers: Shout, Resolve	Water soluble can be diluted and poured down the drain.

ROOFING TAR: Pro- duces toxic fumes. If using a roll on roof tar, use appropriate PPE's to be safe.	Liquids are not allowed at landfills and extra tar could be brushed on cardboard or some other item to dry and hard- ened. Then throw away.
RUBBER ROOFING: Adhesives used for rubber roofing can give off large (VOC's)	Rubber Roofing is fire resistant.
RUST OR CORROSION PREVENTIATIVE: Pe- troleum derived pre- ventatives are handled differently than bio- based products. Read Labels.	Water soluble may be diluted and poured down a drain, others follow di- rections.

PRESCRIPTION DRUGS: Don't keep old medicines.	Prescription drugs may be taken to the Defiance County Sheriff's Office.
Propane Tanks: Do not empty a propane tank by letting the gas escape via the valve. Propane venting can cause an area to be- come flammable very quickly. Propane is heavier than air and can collect at your feet or in a low area.	Take empties to a propane exchange dealer. Not using the full tank, they will ac- cept those as well.
RODENTICIDES: Poisons used to kill mice, rats, ants, roaches, wasps, moles, etc. Wear disposal gloves and wash hands after handling.	Place into a sealed container that has a screw on cap. Secure with tape and place inside a Ziplock bag before throwing in trash.

ACIDS: hydrochloric acid, sulfuric acid, phosphoric acid, and nitric acid	Hazardous. Read all labels for proper han- dling
Adhesives: Gorilla Glue, Super Glue, Loc- tite. White glue, paste and glue stick are the safest to use.	Small amounts can be left opened to dry out, or cut the tube or container to dry out. Large amounts can be spread on card- board or newspapers to dry. When content is hard, it is disposa- ble.
Aerosol Cans: Hair Spray Cans, Oven Cleaner, etc.	Use the entire can. When all pressure is gone, it is safe to dis- pose.
Air Fresheners: Phthalates are the chemicals that are added and could be toxic. Always read la- bels.	Aerosol containers use the entire can. Others, use contents and dispose in trash.

PESTICIDES: Toxicity varies from one pesti- cide to another, all pesticides should be treated with caution. Purchase only quanti- ties to be used and read the label for proper use and dispos- al.	Excess pesticide con- centrate can be diluted per the label and ap- plied to an area.
POOL CHEMICALS: May include chlorine, calcium or sodium, muriatic acid, bicar- bonate, shock (a form of chlorine). When storing pool chemicals keep them dry and out of direct sun. Moisture and heat are both ele- ments that can trigger bad reactions, such as fires and toxic fumes.	Never mix any chemi- cals. Small amounts may be diluted and flushed down a drain. Large amounts may be solidified with sawdust, sand or paper and thrown into the trash.

PAINT:, Oil based, and Water Based can be safely disposed. Lead in paint has been banned since 1978 and mercury as a paint in- gredient, since 1990. If you suspect lead paint was used in an old house, seek profes- sional help.	You should use all of the paint purchased shortly after pur- chased, but that last 2" are rarely used. Leave the lid off to dry up, or add sand, kitty litter, an absor- bent to solidify and then throw in the trash.
PAINT CLEANERS: Turpentine, mineral spirits contain chemi- cals and are flamma- ble. Always use in a vented area.	Use entire contents Add sand, kitty litter, an absorbent to solid- ify and then throw in the trash.
PAINT SOLVENTS: Such as paint thinners and strippers are flam- mable.	Use entire contents Add sand, kitty litter, an absorbent to solid- ify and then throw in the trash.

Animal Supplies: Flea Collars contain insecticides	Flea collars lose po- tency and can be thrown away. Any medicines or non used items could be donated to the Hu- mane Shelter.

ANTIFREEZE: Propyl- ene Glycol based is less toxic than Eth- ylene Glycol. Read the Labels.	Gary's Auto Repair, Advance Auto Parts, Auto Zone, Monro Muffler, Tireman, and O'Reilly's will ac- cept antifreeze.
Appliances: May con- tain a toxic gas called freon.	Most scrap yards will accept freon free ap- pliances.
ART SUPPLIES: Silica Dust, glazes, solvents, paints, formaldehyde.	Read the labels for use, storage and dis- posal. Use all con- tents, or donate to churches or youth or- ganizations.

ASBESTOS: Becomes a hazard when disturbed and fibers are inhaled. Normally found in old floor tiles, insulation.	Used 1940 thru 1970's. Call a professional to test and remove if needed.
Antibacterial Prod- ucts: Purell, Soft Soap, Dial, etc.	Dilute with water and flush down drain.
BATTERIES: Alkaline In 1996 the use of mercury in batteries was phase out.	Are the most common disposable battery. Small dry cell, sealed, non-rechargeable types for handled electronics, toys, etc. May be thrown in trash.
BATTERIES: Rechargeable	Lowe's and Menards will accept these. A bin is located at the front of the stores.

Mothballs: Mothballs are small balls of chemical pesticide and deodorant, sometimes used when storing clothing and other arti- cles susceptible to damage from mold or moth larvae. The chemicals in mothballs are toxic to humans and pets.	People are exposed to the chemicals in moth- balls by inhaling the fumes. If you smell mothballs, you are be- ing exposed to these chemicals. Wrap the mothball into a paper towel and place in a Ziplock bag before throwing into the trash.
MOTOR OIL: Automo- tive and Mechanical uses.	Gary's Auto Repair, Advance Auto Parts, Auto Zone, Monro Muffler, Tireman and O'Reilly's will accept motor oil.
Oven Cleaners: Easy Off, Mr. Clean, Goo Gone	Contain chemicals and some have harsh fumes. Use all content, throw in trash.

MERCURY; Most house- hold items that contain mercury are miniscule. Anything over a pea size, leave the area and call for a professional. Mercury vapors are haz- ardous.	Defiance County Envi- ronmental Services will accept small amounts of Mercury. Place in a glass con- tainer with a lid and put container in a zip lock bag. Thermome- ters and thermostats should be place into zip lock bag.
METAL POLISHES: Could be flammable, toxic and possibly corro- sive. Read the label and all comments.	Liquid Metal polishes must be solidified us- ing an absorbent ma- terial. Pastes or aero- sol cans many be dis- posed of into house- hold waste.
Mildew Remover: May contain harmful chemi- cals. Never mix prod- ucts with chemicals.	Use contents as di- rected. Small amounts slowly pour down drain with running water.

Advance Auto Parts, Auto Zone and O'Reil- ly's will accept bat- teries and issue a gift card. Menards will ac- cept up to 10, NAPA up to 5, and Monro Muffler and Vaughn's Auto Salvage no limit.
BATTERIES: UPS Uninterrupted Power Supply	Backup batteries for computers.
BLEACH: 2 gallons or less water soluble and may be diluted with water and emptied into a drain.	Triple rinse container and check with local recycling program.

Bug Sprays: Off, Raid, aerosols, non- aerosols, wipes, clips, etc.	Liquids may be solidi- fied with cat litter and then dispose in trash.
Car Waxes and Polishes : Read the labels to determine if flammable or toxic.	Liquid products free of chemicals may be diluted with water and flushed. Chemical types should follow directions.
Carpet Supplies: Cleaners and Deo- dorizers.	Most liquid, gel and powder soluble prod- ucts can be disposed down the drain with

Lighter Fluids (Grills): Use the lighter fluid as it was intended.	Use up and throw in trash
Lighter Fluids (Butanes): Use as it was intended.	Use up contents and thrown into trash.
MACHINE OILS & LUBRICANTS; This includes crankcase oil, hydraulic fluids, power steering fluid, motor oils, etc. Oils never wear out, they just get dirty.	Do not mix fluids. Gary's Auto Repair, Ad- vance Auto Parts, Auto Zone, Monro Muffler and Tireman will ac- cept these fluids.
Medicines: Prescribed medication is for the person it is prescribed for only. It could poi- son or have a different affect on someone else.	Place medicines in a un- appealing substance to deter theft. Used kitty litter, grease, wet coffee grounds, etc. Defiance County Sheriff's Office will accept prescription medicines.

Fabric Sof- teners: Snuggle, Downey, Pre-Soaks: Oxi -Clean, Borax, Stain Re- movers: Spray and Wash, Clorox, Biz	May come in liquid, powders, gels, pods or sheets. Contents may emptied, rinsed and thrown into trash. Check with local recy- cling to recycle con- tainers. Throw dryer sheets away
LED Light Bulbs: Is Light Emitting Diode use significantly less energy than a CFL and do not contain mercury.	Can be thrown in the trash, non-toxic, or Menards will accept.

Computers: Compo- nents may include CPU/Tower, Hard Drive, Disc Drive, Key Board, Mouse, Moni- tor, speakers, etc.	CPU's or towers and laptops are recycled with Defiance County Environmental Ser- vices.
CRT's: Cathode Ray Tube	Used in older tube TV's and large com- puter screens. May be disposed in trash or recycled at e-waste events.
DARKROOM CHEMI- CALS: Rapid Fixers contain silver and must be taken to a hazardous facility. Developers, toners, and washing agents may be disposed.	Read labels. Liquids may be diluted and flushed down the drain or hardened and placed into the trash

Ink Cartridges: Many printers, copiers and fax machines have some type of ink car- tridge.	Many manufacturers will accept the re- turned cartridge to be re-filled. Check with the place you bought it from.
INSECTICIDES; Poisons! Read the label, many products have different levels of tox- ins.	Wear proper PPE to avoid going into eyes, nose, mouth or ears. Use entire contents then thrown empty container in trash.

Glass & Window Cleaners: May con- tain alcohol, vinegar and/or bleach. Read the labels.	Dilute with water and place down drain. Check local recycling if the container is recy- clable.
Glue: Proper disposal depends on the main ingredients. Is it wa- ter based or a sol- vent? Read the label	Water based can go into the trash. Solvent glues may be flamma- ble, Open the lid in a vented, unoccupied ar- ea to harden. Or solid- ify with kitty litter or an absorbent and throw in with trash.
Halogen Bulbs Is known as a tungsten halogen quartz- halogen or quartz io- dine bulb or lamp.	Incandescent bulb and can be thrown into the trash or Menards will accept them.
Hand Soap and Body Wash: Soft Soap, Dove, Dial, etc.	Dilute with water and place down drain.

Drugs: Prescription or over the counter.	Go to the Defiance County Sherriff's Of- fice for proper dispos- al. OR place in used kitty litter, wet coffee grounds, rotted food and then you can throw into trash.
E-waste: CPU's, mon- itors, peripherals, laptops, readers, tab- lets are referred to as e-waste.	Check for local e- waste or electronics events to be recycled.
Fertilizer: Fertilizer without pesticides and only contain plant nutrients DO NOT require special disposal. Fertilizers that have pesticides such as pre- emergent, weed pre- venter or disease control do.	Liquid fertilizer with- out pesticides may be diluted with water and poured down sink. With pesticides use it as directed, outside on the ground.

FILTERS Mechanical: Used oil filters can contain up to 10 ounc- es of used oil.	Many auto shops will keep the filters to drain of used oil.
Floor Supplies: Clean- ers such as Lysol, Clorox, Mop and Glo, Fabuloso, Pine Sol and waxes.	Dilute with water and place down drain. Check local recycling if the container is recy- clable.
FLUORESCENT LIGHT TUBES; Fluorescent contains a gas and a small amount of mer- cury.	Menards will accept these to be recycled from residents only. Bring to front desk.
Freezers: Freon is a toxic gas in refrigera- tors and freezers.	Many scrap yards will accept freon free appli- ances.

FUNGICIDES; Fun- gicides, herbicides and insecticides are all pesticides.	Use entire content as directed. Read labels.
Furniture Polish: Pledge, Old English, Liquid Gold	Use entire contents, thrown into trash.
GASOLINE; Highly flammable and ex- tremely toxic. Is a health and environ- mental hazard if spilled.	Gary's Auto Repair, Monro Muffler and Tireman, will accept old gasoline.
GASOLINE MIXED; 2-cylce gas, pre- mixes, still toxic	Gary's Auto Repair, Monro Muffler and Tireman, will accept old gasoline.
